Welcome to worship

This convention appropriately begins with worship. May the Lord bless us as we praise his name and proclaim his truth to one another, gaining strength to embrace our crosses as we anticipate crowns in glory.

There are restrooms, a mother's room, and a room for small children on the lower level.

Convention worship themes

All sermons and devotions at this convention are based on readings from the Revelation of St. John.

Dr. Siegbert Becker, who taught at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary from 1969–1984, wrote a wonderful book about Revelation. He chose the title *Revelation: The Distant Triumph Song*. This echoes the hymn "For All the Saints": "And when the fight is fierce, the warfare long, steals on the ear the distant triumph-song" (stanza 5, see page 16). The hymn ably carries the theme of this convention: "Embrace the Cross—Anticipate the Crown." A simple summary of Revelation's theme is this: At times Christian life will be terribly difficult, but God promises that we will enjoy eternal victory in the end. This promise gives us perspective and strength for carrying our crosses. Becker's book described the message of Revelation this way:

Just as Christ came to glory and exaltation by way of humiliation and death (Php 2:6-11), just as he was made "perfect through suffering" (He 2:10), so the royal priesthood of believers must also expect to come to the crown of life by way of the cross...

In a time of testing the book of Revelation was written. The Roman authorities were making a concerted effort to wipe out the infant church. . . . In such a time of danger and temptation the Savior once more rephrased the lesson his church should have learned from his victory. Like the Savior himself, they too were kings and priests. But the manifestation of their kingship and their priesthood was to come only after suffering and death. "We live by faith, not by sight" (2 Cor 5:7). It is a lesson we all need to learn.

John teaches us not to look for victories in this world and in this life. Instead, Revelation reminds us of the words of the Savior, "In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (Jn 16:33). (Pages 1-4)

In his commentary from *The People's Bible* series, Wayne Mueller (who also taught at the seminary, 1984–1990) summarizes the purpose of Revelation: "It provides the suffering church a beautiful new assurance of Jesus' final victory. Revelation is an expansion of the risen and ascended Savior's promise 'Surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age' (Matthew 28:20). Revelation centers on Jesus and his defeat of sin, death, and the devil" (page 1).

The distant triumph-song is echoed in the refrain of today's Song of Praise (a substitute for the Gloria in excelsis): "God's right hand and holy arm have won the victory" (see page 4). This hymn comes from the Service Music section of the new hymnal (933ff). Hymns in this section may replace canticles in various services.

This service features musical resources far beyond most congregations, but it also models ways to introduce unfamiliar songs. While some of the music for instrumentalists and choir in today's service is challenging, some is quite simple—possible in most congregations with a single vocal soloist and instrumentalists of modest ability.

Preservice Music

The first two selections are based on a hymn new to WELS. The tune is well known in Germany and appears in the hymnal of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod. The text by the great hymn writer Paul Gerhardt was newly translated for CW21. To follow the text or tune, see page 8.

Holy Spirit, giver of life, through Word and sacrament bestow on us the wisdom and power we need to witness clearly and to act boldly. Help us to speak the truth in love, to give the reason for the hope we have, and to conduct ourselves with gentleness and respect.

Set our hearts on fire as we work and witness for Christ.

Hear us, Lord, as we pray for a family member, a neighbor, or a friend who does not believe in you, or whose faith is weak or troubled.

Silent prayer

Bless the Church with men and women who are willing to proclaim your Word in places where we cannot go. Keep them and their loved ones in your care and let nothing hinder their work. By the power of the gospel, restore their spirits each day, so that they do not lose heart as they serve us and others. **Move us to support them with our sincere prayers and generous offerings.**

Wherever your Word is proclaimed, O Lord, grant it success. Let your kingdom come to us and others, so that we and many more might join the assembly of saints and angels to sing your praise forever.

Savior of all, hear our prayer and help us in our mission. Amen.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give him thanks and praise.

It is truly good and right that we should at all times and in all places give you thanks, O Lord, holy Father, almighty and everlasting God, through Jesus Christ our Lord, who promised that wherever two or three come together in his name, there he is with them to shepherd his flock until he comes again in glory. Therefore, with all the saints on earth and hosts of heaven, we praise your holy name and join their glorious song:



Prayer of Thanksgiving

Lord God, you are worthy to receive thanks and praise from all people. You created the world and all who live in it, and in your mercy you saved us. We give thanks to you for the grace of your Son, Jesus Christ.

Distribution

Holy Communion is served by continuous distribution. At the direction of the ushers, approach the altar and receive the body of the Lord from the minister. You may extend your hand to receive the wafer. To receive the blood of the Lord, you may guide the cup with your hand or use an individual cup.

If you require a gluten-free wafer, take one from the small plate before proceeding to the minister.
